THOUGHTS FROM PASTOR FRANCIE...



"After the sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow. For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said." (Matthew 28:1-6)

Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed! Easter is the most joyful day of the Christian year. It's the day when we commemorate the most joyful event of the Christian faith – that Jesus is risen, conquering the power of sin and death. We do not need to fear death or anything else.

For the first Christians, the importance of Jesus's resurrection led them to worship on the first day of the week (Sunday) instead of the seventh day of the week (Saturday). By a kind word to someone who is discouraged, by providing food for those who are hungry, by visiting those who are sick or imprisoned – Jesus said that when we do these things for the least of these, it's as if we were doing it for Jesus.

One of my favorite songs is "Find us Faithful," written by Steve Green. The chorus says:

Oh may all who come behind us find us faithful May the fire of our devotion light their way May the footprints that we leave Lead them to believe And the lives we live inspire them to obey Oh may all who come behind us find us faithful

May our prayer at this Easter season be that "all who come behind us find us faithful."

As of January 31, 2024

Our General Fund Income and Expense through January 31st is as follows:

As of January 31st, we had \$148,557.31 in the bank. Most of this money, or \$128,801.17 is in the General Fund.

Each year we collect Per Capita from each of our members. The Per Capita amount this year is \$32.50. That money is forwarded to the Presbytery for various uses. Please make a note with your contribution if you want to pay your Per Capita.

As of February 29, 2024

Our General Fund Income and Expense through January 31st is as follows:

As of February 29th, we had \$152,882.37 in the bank. Most of this money, or \$133,352.31 is in the General Fund. Please note that in both January and February, we had quite a bit of rental income. Both Prevail and the daycare paid multiple months in advance. In February, the Presbytery paid a full year of rent in advance.

At the request of session, I will now report income showing whether the money came from contributions, rent, or some other source. The other income category includes interest, investment income, and miscellaneous income.

Each year we collect Per Capita from each of our members. The Per Capita amount this year is \$32.50. That money is forwarded to the Presbytery for various uses. Please make a note with your contribution when you pay your Per Capita.

In the next month, you will notice a few additions to our grounds. Four raised beds will be installed as well as a rain barrel. The produce from the community garden will complement our blessing box and the rain barrel will be used to help water the garden.

We are working with Diana Munro, a Firestone Park resident and *His & Her Landscaping* on the installation of the raised beds. In addition, *His & Her* will patch-up the grass in front of the blessing box. Sherry Priest worked with *Randy the Gardener* and was able to get the rain barrel donated along with the installation.

Diana was instrumental in the community garden project. Diana approached our church last year asking if we would be interested in such a project. Due to the timing of this discussion, it was decided to go with the grow bags and with a community garden in 2024.

Diana is a certified gardener and is very passionate for the betterment of the Firestone Park community and our church. Years back when her husband was laid off our church provided food and Christmas gifts in their time of need. She has never forgotten our generosity. As a note, on a weekly basis, Diana and her daughter fill our blessing box.

On Saturday May 18th, we will have a Community Garden Planting party. The fun starts at 11:00 a.m. with a rain date of Sunday May 19th at noon. We will provide seeds, plants, and light lunch.


